ACACIA Alumni Contribute \$10,937.50 to Scholarship Fund Drive

A big **THANK YOU** to all of our alumni who contributed so much this year to our scholarship fund drive! Nineteen alumni and one little sister contributed to this year's successful scholarship fund drive. The names listed are those of our alumni who have contributed to either the **Iowa State Foundation** or the **ACACIA Fraternity Foundation**. We do not yet know if some of our other alumni have contributed to the general ACACIA Foundation, but once we find out, we will recognize them and their contributions as well.

The Corporate Board has established a number of scholarship programs that we hope our alumni will support for the benefit of the active members of our chapter. Two of the scholarship programs that were set up a number of years ago are run through the Iowa State Foundation. One of these is the **ACACIA Leadership Scholarship** and is used solely to provide scholarships to all of our pledges who complete initiation and become full members of our Fraternity. Each new Active receives a \$500 academic scholarship. The second scholarship is the **ACACIA Undergraduate Scholarship** and provides a scholarship to each active member of the House who achieves a 3.00 grade average, lives in the house, and is active in Fraternity programs on campus.

We also have an account with the ACACIA Fraternity Foundation called the **Iowa State Chapter Fund**. When our alumni donate money to this account, the Corporate Board has a wider discretion in the use of these funds for scholarships or other educational activities, such as the purchase of study materials, conversion costs of rooms for solely study purposes, and so on. We are encouraging all of our alumni to contribute to this fund, as earnings on the funds go to support our International Fraternity as well as our local chapter.

Active Chapter Retains #2 Spot among ISU Fraternities

The ACACIA Pledge Class earned top spot among all the chapters, with the entire house continuing to lay claim to the #2 position in the ISU Greek System. As before, the competition is stiff and only a few one-hundredths of a point separate the top five houses. The rankings for the top five pledge classes and the top five fraternities are as follows:

Corporate Board Awards \$5,800 in Scholarships to ISU ACACIANS

Superior academic performance continues to be a hallmark of the ISU Chapter of ACACIA Fraternity. To recognize their success, the Corporate Board awarded scholarships totaling \$5,800 to the men of the chapter for the Spring, 2003 semester. **Congratulations go out to fifteen of the seventeen men in the House who earned scholarships!**

Seven new members of the Fraternity each received a \$500 **ACACIA Leadership Scholarship**. These new members include Ryan Anderson, Christian Cox, Martin Gran, David Jessen, Trenton Norman, Tristan Pritchard-Meaker, and Nathan Russell.

In addition, twelve members received scholarships from the ACACIA Undergraduate Scholarship. This scholarship is based on academic performance and involvement in house activities. The members earning this scholarship include Ryan Anderson, David Frost, Michael Gano, Gregory Janda, Jeffrey Landherr, Christopher MacKenzie, Michael O'Doherty, Jeffrey Peil, Aaron Rosheim, Martin Gran, Trenton Norman, and Nathan Russell.

A number of years ago, the Corporate Board established two scholarships through the ISU Foundation. The **ACACIA Leadership Scholarship** was established to provide financial support to high school graduates in their first year of college at Iowa State. All new members of the Fraternity who successfully complete initiation are awarded a scholarship from this fund.

The second scholarship is known as the **ACACIA Undergraduate Scholarship**. This scholarship fund provides money to active members of the House who earn at least a 3.00 grade average and/or are actively involved in the chapter in a substantial manner.

We also have a scholarship fund known as the **Iowa State Chapter Fund** that is maintained as a part of the **ACACIA Fraternity Foundation**. Money for these scholarships comes from the generous support of our alumni, without whose support these funds would not be possible. An Overview of the Scholarship Programs available for ISU Acacians

When we first started the process of returning our chapter to Iowa State, the Corporate Board was convinced that outstanding academic performance was going to be a hallmark of the new Chapter. We were convinced that this would be a key to our ultimate success. The Corporate Board initially laid the foundation for this emphasis on academic success by establishing three scholarships through the ISU Foundation.

The first scholarship program to be created was the **ACACIA Leadership Scholarship**. We are currently using this account to provide scholarships to all pledges that successfully complete the pledge program and become new Brothers in the Fraternity. Each new active receives a \$500 scholarship from this fund. Currently, there is a balance of \$2,017.64 in this account.

The second scholarship is known as the **ACACIA Undergraduate Scholarship**. Actives who live in the Fraternity receive a \$100 scholarship each semester that they achieve specific grade and other involvement criteria. There is currently \$3,246.22 available in this account.

A third account is the **ACACIA Graduate Scholarship** which is used to provide financial support to graduate students who live in the Fraternity. This account was used when Dalen McVay served as our Chapter Advisor / House Manager and attended graduate school at Iowa State. At present, this account is not being used, but could be reactivated again in the

future if it is needed. There is a balance of \$2.24 in this account.

The Acacia Fraternity Foundation also provides a scholarship account for our chapter through the **Iowa State Chapter Fund**. This year we asked our alumni to contribute to this account in support of the chapter, and they contributed a total of \$4,410 to this account. This account is extremely valuable in that it may be used for educational activities beyond simply those for scholarships. This includes items such as the purchase of study / library materials and room modification costs to create study or library rooms.

A summary of the funds currently available in these various accounts is as follows:

Greetings my Brother ACACIANS!

Although it was pretty subtle, you may have picked up on the fact that this newsletter is focused on the scholarship programs and academic achievements of the men of our chapter of Acacia Fraternity. Without a doubt, the men of our chapter have demonstrated an outstanding ability to achieve both academically and socially since we formally rechartered our chapter in October, 2001.

But I would be remiss if I did not recognize those alumni who have, over the years, been active financial contributors to the scholarship programs of the chapter as well. I have been gratified to see increasing numbers of alumni demonstrate their faith in the young men of our chapter by making financial contributions to the Fraternity.

Brother Tom Witthauer got the ball rolling with the first donation in 1997. He hoped that this action would spur others to similarly support a scholarship program for the local chapter. Unfortunately, without a Scholarship Chairman to coordinate the effort, it languished while we lacked having a formal chapter of the Fraternity.

In calendar year 2000, with the recolonization of the active chapter, six Acacians made their first contributions. The Brothers who showed the initial support were Hugo E. Mayer - #441, Donald G. Lyon - #461, John B. Pugh - #442, Don Messer - #447, Daniel Wise - #479, and Dan Wisner - #854.

Progress continued in 2001 with the successful rechartering of the chapter. That year, nine Brothers actively contributed to the scholarship programs of the chapter. These Brothers were Dean Platt - #321, Charles Dozois - #379, John Tschantz - #385, Victor Dennis - #394, Richard Wilson - #409, Donald Larson - #437, John Pugh - #442, Hiko Takeda - #554, and Harold Zarr - #814.

In 2002, Jeremy Davis was elected to the position of Scholarship Chairman. He brought a new drive, energy and focus to the program. His efforts showed substantial results with twenty Brothers and one Little Sister all contributing to the various scholarship or capital improvement accounts. I won't repeat their names here (as they are all listed on the first page of the newsletter), but we are definitely grateful and humbled to given such a vote of confidence by so many of our alumni.

As you will read in Jeremy's report later in the newsletter, he is continually working to improve communication with our alumni. His goal is to create a progressive charitable program that will recognize the contributions and efforts of both the alumni and the active chapter members for years to come. Our alumni are critical to the success of this program, and I

hope that you will support his efforts on behalf of your chapter.

Happy New Year! As with any New Year, it is without a doubt that you set a New Year’s Resolution and will dedicate yourself to achieve the goal that you have set for yourself. For the Iowa State Acacian’s, our New Year’s Resolution is to continue to build upon the success of the chapter as we move forward to become the best fraternity at Iowa State! This is not just a whimsical dream, but rather, it is a concept that can be realized through the continued support of our alumni brothers.

Last fall, the **Sharing The Acacia Spirit** giving campaign was launched. Since that time a number of our alumni brothers have stepped forward and announced their commitment to

help the Iowa State Chapter of Acacia Fraternity become the best fraternity in the ISU Greek System! The **Sharing The Acacia Spirit** giving campaign was created to allow all Iowa State Acacia alumni to voluntarily contribute financial support to the men of Acacia. Contributors have the option to make their gift over the course of ten years, and they have two options through which they may contribute. One option is to give a **tax-deductible gift** to the **Iowa State Chapter Fund** through the **Acacia Fraternity Foundation**. A second option is to provide a non-tax-deductible gift directly to The Acacian's Capital Improvements Account. No matter how the gift is given, our contributors can be assured that their funds will be used to ensure the success of the Iowa State Chapter of Acacia Fraternity.

As stated earlier, the primary goal for the Iowa State Chapter of Acacia Fraternity is to become the best fraternity in the ISU Greek System. We will only be able to achieve this goal if our alumni brothers make the commitment to ensure the chapter's success. It is time for the chapter to be taken to the proverbial, "next level" and in order to accomplish that, **we need your support**. To achieve this goal, The Acacian's have created a unique giving opportunity for our alumni brothers in addition to the **Sharing The Acacia Spirit** multi-year giving campaign.

If you have visited the chapter house during the past two years, you probably have noticed that the house does not have a true library/study area, which is one room that the active members would like to see added to the chapter house. The proposed area for this library/study room is in the lower level of the house. Currently, the open area in the lower level is where the bar is located. Because the chapter house is a "dry" house, it is something that is not used. As a result, in order to create the library/study room with the needed renovation of the lower level, as well as to purchase desks, bookshelves, etc., a substantial financial contribution will be needed from our alumni Brothers. We estimate that it will cost \$75,000 to remodel and create this room. The Corporate Board does not have the funds to accomplish this improvement to our Chapter House, and we are asking that one, or a combination of Brothers, step forward with a contribution of \$75,000 to create this library/study room. **Under current IRS guidelines, this contribution would be 100% tax-deductible. In addition, the donor (or donor's) would have the room named for them in their honor.**

If you have visited the chapter house, you will also have noticed that the president's room on the upper level is by far the nicest room in the house. Could you imagine leaving a better legacy for all future Iowa State Acacians to see than through having the president's room named after you? This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to have your name permanently affixed to the President's Room, and this can be realized with a financial gift of only \$30,000.
