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## ISU Chapter Receives Superior Chapter Award at 2008 Conclave

The biennial conclave of Acacia was held from August 6-10, 2008 in Louisville, Kentucky and the Iowa State Chapter was recognized in multiple categories for excellence in chapter and alumni activities.

There are three “levels” of awards that can be presented to chapters as a whole. These are commonly referred to as the **Founders Achievement Awards** are considered to be the most prestigious awards that can be given to a chapter of the Fraternity.

The third place award is called the “Outstanding Chapter,” second place is the “Superior Chapter,” and the top prize is known as the “Malcolm Award.” The Iowa State Chapter was one of two chapters to receive the 2<sup>nd</sup> place (or Superior Chapter) award at this year’s Conclave. While it would have nice to receive the Malcolm Award, receiving this award does signify that we are recognized as one of the top three chapters in the Fraternity as whole – and that is no small achievement!

One award that Iowa State Chapter received was the **Human Service Program Award**. This award is designed to recognize chapters that excel in charity-based projects both on an individual basis and as a chapter as a whole. We received the Human Service award in part due to our work with **Pages of Promise**, which collects used textbooks and sends them to universities in Africa. The chapter annually collects over 10,000 textbooks which are sent to schools in Africa.

The May, 2008 issue of the newsletter described in great detail many of the projects that the chapter had been involved in during the past year including the Dance Marathon that raised money for the Children’s Miracle Network and University of Iowa Children’s Hospital, the work at Camp Heartland for children or members of their families that suffer from HIV/AIDS, mentoring at Ames middle schools, coaching at the Ames High School, and cleaning up a two-mile stretch of the interstate on the east of Ames to name but a few.

A second award that we earned was the **Chapter Programming / Membership Education Award**. We received the Programming award due to our decision to serve as a Cornerstones pilot chapter and all of the opportunities that affords our members for growth, along with various speakers that have given presentations to the chapter on topics such as how to better manage risk in the fraternity setting.

The third award that the chapter received was the **G.K. Nelson Academic Programming Award**. This award examines and compares the academic results of a chapter with those of the corresponding Greek system and university average’s at each chapters location. The award includes such factors as a chapters reward system for academic excellence, minimum GPA for initiation, number of scholarships awarded to the chapter members by the Acacia Fraternity Foundation, and the extent to which a scholarship recruitment program has been used by the chapter when rushing potential members. The consistently outstanding results that our chapter has achieved since the chapter was recolonized in 2000 earned us this award.

The chapter was also presented with the **Best Publication Award** for the publication of our alumni newsletter. Our

chapter was recognized in part, because we continue to send out a written newsletter to all of the alumni of the chapter. Many chapters have gone to an all-electronic format, and they have seen a decline in participation on the part of the alumni in events as this has occurred.

Our publication has been sent out on a quarterly basis for the past twelve years, and we closely coordinate the updating of mailing lists with the national headquarters. The newsletter has undergone a number of format changes over the years, and we are moving in the direction of providing more pictures and a wider variety of stories within the newsletter. But the basic intent of the publication remains the same – to provide a common forum for our alumni to communicate with each other and to learn about all of the activities in which the active chapter members are engaged. To that end, we have succeeded quite well.

During the awards banquet, our own Jeremy N. Davis was recognized for all of his hard work as Chapter Advisor. Jeremy was one of the refounding fathers of the chapter when it was recolonized, and served as the venerable dean of the chapter. After graduation, he volunteered to be the chapter advisor, a position he has held ever since.

The **Spring, 2008** semester grade results are in, and **Acacia Fraternity** once again stands atop all of the other fraternities in the Iowa State Greek System for top academic honors. The results for the top five chapters are as follows:

It is well worth noting that our fraternity achieved the distinction of having the **highest affiliated grade point average**.

Academic excellence is a hallmark of the members of Acacia Fraternity. **As you can see from the table on this page, our chapter has been ranked #1 for nine out of the past ten semesters!** Our newest Acacia Brothers had a grade point average of 3.29, easily besting the next closest competitor (Beta Sigma Psi) who had a 3.13 grade point average. Our chapter has focused on attracting only the best and brightest young men, and the results speak for themselves.

Our focus remains on recruiting only **exceptional men** who are **dedicated to their academic studies** and to making a **positive contribution to society**. This has been a core strategy which has been shown to be successful over the years. It is our focus on academics, personality, and a demonstrated level of leadership which has enabled us to build the preeminent academic Fraternity at Iowa State.

**Pavel I. Beresnev**

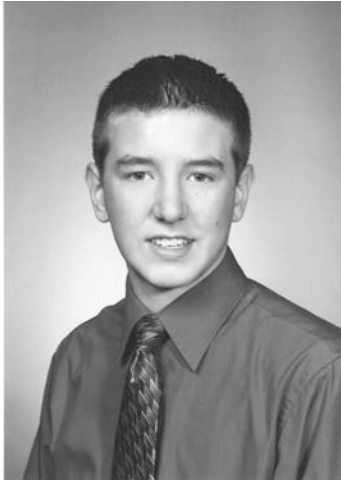

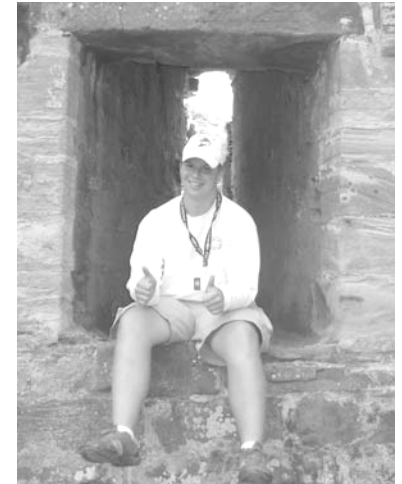
**Zhong Zheng**

## Renovations to 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor are nearly Complete!

A few months ago, the men in the chapter approached the Corporate Board with a proposal to convert two of the rooms on the third floor into a library/study area. It also included converting the bathroom into a private bathroom attached to the room on the north side of the third floor. We are happy to report that this project has been virtually completed and the men of the chapter are in the process of moving into and enjoying this new living and library area.

The overall dimensions of the study area where the table and chairs and reading chairs have been placed are 11-1/2 feet by 21 feet.



This picture is a view of the room looking to the northwest. There is a large study table in the center of the room where two rooms previously existed. Ten men can sit at this table at one time, making it ideal for the Brothers to work on class projects as a team. At the bottom of the photo you see one corner of the railing surrounding the stairs leading up to the third floor.

On the left side of the picture you can see the bench seating area that runs along the length of the room, directly in front of the six windows along the west side of the room. The bench seating covers the air conditioning ducts that were installed on the third floor about twelve years ago. We are currently in the process of selecting an area rug that will go under the table and chairs. This should be arriving and be installed right around September 1<sup>st</sup>. We are also looking to find cushions that can be placed on top of this bench seating area.

The next picture is a view of the room looking to the south. As you see, the custom built bookshelves have been installed, and the two leather reading chairs are sitting in front of the bookshelves. This picture was taken before the historical books of the chapter, the chapter charter and awards were installed. Locking glass windows will be installed in front of the area holding the chapter charter.



The next picture shows the room looking to the southeast. This picture gives you a good view of the railing surrounding the stairway from the second floor. The contractor reproduced the existing vertical railing with a number of additional pieces to match the previous ones with a natural oak stain and varnish. All of the carpeting that was in this area has been removed, and the floors were sanded, restained, and coated with multiple layers of polyurethane sealer.



Overhead lighting provides plenty of light in the evening and is designed to match the style of an “arts and crafts” house.

There is a two-man room to the north of the library that has been remodeled and has had new carpeting installed. The previously “shared” third-floor bathroom is now open only to this room, thus making it a private bathroom for the Brothers who occupy this room.

The third floor kitchenette is still in place, complete with a small “apartment-sized” stove, refrigerator, and sink. This room will be cleaned up and painted and the appliances installed during work week (August 18-22).

The balcony on the third floor off of the Drdla President's Room was also worked on by the contractor. The drain was cleaned out and replaced, along with some of the roofing materials directly under the balcony. This balcony was installed when the house was a "bed and breakfast" and is accessed via a sliding glass door from the Drdla President's Room.

A dedication ceremony for this new room will be performed during our centennial celebration in March, 2009. A special plaque recognizing the alumni who have donated \$5,000 or more to this project will be installed on the south wall next to the bookshelves.

**If you would like to have your name included on this plaque, the deadline for contributions to the project is December 31, 2008. We will order the plaque right after this date so that we can have it in time to be installed**

**during our 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration in 2009. Any alumnus of the chapter who donates \$5,000 or more will have the library named in their honor and their name will be included on the plaque.**

We are deeply grateful to the alumni who have generously supported this project. The total project cost is estimated at \$40,000, and our alumni have donated more than \$26,000 towards its cost, making it possible for us to complete this project. Their willingness to step forward and help us with this project made it possible, and we as a Board and Chapter cannot thank them enough for what they have done. I want to take this opportunity to recognize everyone who has contributed so generously to this project and have enabled us to provide an outstanding library and study area for the men of the chapter. **Our deepest thanks to each and every one of the alumni who have supported us in this project!**

## **New Windows Installed on July 7, 2008**

Thanks go out to all of our alumni who have generously donated to our effort to complete the installation of new, energy efficient windows in the chapter house. The board has been diligently saving money for this project for the last three or four years as well, and between our alumni and the money that the Board has been able to save we were able to

accumulate enough money to replace virtually all of the remaining windows in the chapter house.

This picture shows an employee of Renewal by Anderson installing the new windows on the second floor on the west

side of the chapter house. Some twenty windows were all installed in **one day** by this firm!



These windows are in the “prairie style” which is consistent with an arts and crafts style of home. They match the windows that we installed a few years ago, and have really helped to improve the overall appearance of the property. These windows are consistent with the intent of the Board to

ensure that maintenance and improvement projects to the chapter house are performed in a timely manner to both maintain and improve the chapter facility whenever possible.

The previous set of windows that were installed made a noticeable difference in the comfort level in the house. The installation of these windows and the added insulation that we are installing in the third floor should (we hope) produce some sizable savings for us with respect to the cost of heating the chapter house this coming winter.

Future projects include tuck pointing of the exterior walls and a number of landscaping projects to the front yard of the house. The landscaping projects include replacement of the front sidewalk, edging of the flower gardens around the house and replacement of the wooden fence between the yard and the parking lot with a combination limestone wall and flower garden.

We send our thanks out to all of our alumni who have generated so generously for this project. Your generosity has really made a difference in the lives of your Brothers who live in the chapter house!

## **Plans for 100<sup>th</sup> Celebration Progressing Rapidly**

The Board is in the process of finalizing plans for the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration of the chapter next March. We have prepared a **tentative outline** of the activities that we have

scheduled at this point in time. Please note that we have a number of final details to work out, but we wanted to give all of our alumni a “heads up” on the events that we have planned



and some of the costs involved. **A final schedule and reservation form will be mailed with the November newsletter**, but we feel that it is important that all of our alumni should be finalizing their plans of attending this once-in-a-lifetime event.

Room reservations can be made at the Memorial Union (800-433-3449). When calling, be certain to tell them that this is for the Acacia Fraternity 100<sup>th</sup> Celebration. Some alumni have already made reservations, so don't wait or you may lose out!

Also, don't forget to bring a camera so that you can take pictures!

The November newsletter will include a final reservation form that you will need to return by **January 1, 2009** in order to reserve your place at the reunion. We will have limited seating for the banquet, so you will want to keep that in mind if you plan to attend. It will strictly be a first-come, first-served event, so don't wait to send in your reservation form, or you may be left out in the cold!

I think that everyone knows that we have been working on writing a history book of the Iowa State Chapter. We are going to produce two versions of this book. **One version will be a hard-bound book that will be sold for a tax-deductible donation to the book fund for \$500 each.** Alumni who purchase this version will have their name included on a special dedication page at the beginning of the book recognizing their contribution to the history book fund. **Only alumni who contribute to the history book fund will receive a hard-cover book. No extra hard-cover books will be produced.** The alumni who contribute to the publishing of the book will receive their book on Saturday evening during the banquet.

**Every alumnus who attends the celebration will receive a free, soft-bound copy of the history book of the Iowa State Chapter.** These will be given out at the banquet on Saturday, March 14, 2009.

The Corporate Board has also commissioned commemorative coins of this event to be struck. The coins will be individually numbered. They will go on sale on Saturday following the dedication of the Library. We will only have a limited number of coins (approximately 135) struck, and once they are sold, there will not be any more made. We are still working on the design and determining the final cost of these coins, but we anticipate that the cost will be \$25-\$30 each. We are also planning on auctioning off the first five coins during the banquet to raise funds for our scholarship program. Details on these coins will be provided in the November newsletter.

The **TENTATIVE** outline for this three-day event as it exists at this point is as follows.

**Friday – March 13, 2009**

A reception for all alumni who are able to attend this event will be held. Guests of Honor will be all past and present members of the Board of The Acacians. A presentation on the writing of the history book of the Iowa State Chapter of Acacia Fraternity will be given by its authors. Refreshments will be served to all who attend. **This event is free to everyone.**

**Saturday – March 14, 2009**

A bunch (**free for all who attend**) will be provided at the chapter house from 8:00 am – 10:00 am. Tours of the remodeled facility will also be given by members of the chapter.

The Corporate Board of the Acacians will be meeting in the Gallery Room of the Memorial Union starting at 10:00 am. All alumni of the chapter are invited to attend. The Acacia National Council will meet in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor Library of the chapter house starting at 10:00 am.

At 12:00 pm, a light luncheon will be provided at the chapter house. **This event is free for all who attend.**

At 2:00 pm, a formal dedication of the new Library will be held where the alumni who have donated \$5,000 or more to the Library will have it named in their honor. Additional dedications and recognitions will be made at this time.

From 2:30 – 4:00 pm, walking tours of the campus will be provided for the alumni by members of the active chapter.

At 6:00 pm, a social hour (with a cash bar) will be held in the South Ballroom in the Memorial Union. At 7:00 pm, the banquet will be served followed at 8:00 pm by the program for the evening. We expect that the cost for the banquet will be between \$35-\$40 per person. The program should end at 10:30 pm.
