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Brother Sam Carstens Receives Award of Merit

Introduced at Acacia's Golden Anniversary celebrations in 1954, the Award of Merit is one of Acacia's highest honors. The criteria that stipulates who is entitled to receive this award requires the following:

"...Brothers who have given of their time and substance unstintingly for the promotion and furtherance of Acacia, both nationally and locally, and brothers who have rendered outstanding service in their chosen fields, and have attained high position therein, thus exemplifying the motto of Acacia, human service, and the teachings of the fraternity, which constantly admonish our members to prepare themselves as educated men to take a more active part in their communities."

Brother Sam Carstens, a long-serving board member and a Brother who has supported several of Acacia's educational programs, including the lead gift for the 3rd Floor Library, is a highly deserving recipient of the Award of Merit. During the Parent/Alumni Scholarship Luncheon on April 17, 2011, International Second Vice President Jeremy Davis, International Undergraduate Counselor Michael Weber, and Alumni Board President Harold Zarr presented Brother Sam Carstens with the Award of Merit.

Brother Carstens joins a very small and select group of men from the Iowa State Chapter who have received this award. In our 100+ year history, only seven men have previously been accorded this honor. Brother Carstens is now the eighth man from the Iowa State Chapter to receive the Award of Merit. Previous winners of this award include Frank R. Mendell - #198, John B. Pugh - #442, Darrel S. Metcalfe - #455, Walter R. Kolbe - #527, H. Keith Sawyers, - #542, Calvin O. Hultman - #638, and Harold D. Zarr Jr. - #814.

Nomination for the Award of Merit Robert L. "Sam" Carstens - #354

Few Brothers of the Fraternity have had as distinguished a career of service to the Fraternity as have had Brother Carstens. Initiated on January 30, 1942, Brother Carstens was one of four groups of men initiated during the early years of World War II into Acacia Fraternity. After serving in World War II, Brother Carstens returned to Iowa State where he earned advanced degrees in Civil Engineering and served as a member of faculty at Iowa State College (later University) from 1964 until 1986, when he was appointed Professor Emeritus, Civil and Construction.

Brother Carstens was elected to serve on the Corporate Board in 1967, and served in a variety of positions, including that of Board President for the next ten years. Brother Carstens was also one of the principle participants in, and supporter of, the campaign to build a new chapter house in the 1967-1970, even though the campaign failed to reach its goal of building a new chapter house. During these ten years, Brother Carstens continued to serve on and lead the Corporate Board as it worked through the many negative issues that confronted fraternities in general during that time period. Following his retirement from the Board in 1977, Brother Carstens returned in 1985 to manage the Masonic Loan Fund for the Board which was designed to assist members of the fraternity cover the cost of their education by providing them with low-interest loans to attend Iowa State.

When the project to build a new library on the third floor of the chapter house was announced in 2008, Brother Carstens was the very first person to step forward with a \$5,000 donation to get the project moving forward. One of the reasons the Burger-

Carstens-Davis-Good Library exists on the 3rd floor of the chapter house is because of his early involvement in this project. He has also been one of the most significant contributors to the chapters' scholarship and capital improvement funds since the chapter was recolonized in 2000. Beginning in 2002, Brother Carstens has been recognized for his generosity by receiving awards as a Bronze Partner (scholarship fund) in 2002, a Bronze Partner (scholarship fund) in 2003, a Silver Partner (scholarship fund) in 2004, a Chapter Partner (scholarship fund) in 2006, a Chapter Partner in 2007 (scholarship fund), a member of the Board of Directors Club (library fund), a Chapter Partner (capital improvements) and a Silver Partner (scholarship fund) in 2008, a Chapter Partner (scholarship fund) 2009, and a Chapter Partner

(for both the scholarship fund and capital improvements fund) in 2010. His financial support has helped to ensure the success of the scholarship program and has been instrumental in helping our members meet the financial burden of attending Iowa State.

Most importantly, during his forty plus years of involvement as an alumnus of the chapter, Brother Carstens has never sought recognition for his work. Yet, his support and tireless efforts on behalf of the chapter have helped to ensure the success that enjoys today. This is a long overdue recognition of, and reward for, all of the many years of support provided by Brother Carstens.

Dan Congreve and Matt England Receive Order of Pythagoras

Established in 1962, The Order of Pythagoras recognizes contributions to Acacia Fraternity by those "serving beyond the ordinary call of duty." Election to the Order of Pythagoras is by the International Council and may include alumni, undergraduates and, occasionally, non-Acadians. This is the second highest award that may be given to an Acacian.

At this luncheon, we recognized the achievements of two of our undergraduate brothers, and we were proud to present these two undergraduate brothers Dan Congreve and Matt England with the Order of Pythagoras during the Parent/Alumni Scholarship Luncheon on April 17, 2011.

Daniel N. Congreve - #1036**

As a member of the Iowa State Chapter, Brother Congreve has served in a number of roles, including Senior Dean, Scholarship Chair and Philanthropy Chair. While serving as the Scholarship Chair, Brother Congreve created and implemented a formal academic achievement plan for the chapter (first since recolonization) to assist those members who were struggling

academically. Through his leadership, the chapter has been recognized with having the highest GPA among all fraternities at Iowa State for several semesters. As Philanthropy Chair, Brother Congreve has exhibited the ideal of human service in many ways, most notably by coordinating the chapter's Pages of Promise philanthropy and collecting a record-number of books for donation to students in Africa during his tenure.

From an academic perspective, Brother Congreve has repeatedly excelled. Recently, he was accepted into a PHD program at MIT. Additionally, Brother Congreve has also been selected as a recipient of a National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowship, which is a three-year \$120,000 grant to assist him with his research.

**Nomination for the Order of Pythagoras
Matthew B. England - #1047**

Few members have the time, energy and dedication to excel at all activities in which they are engaged, but we have within the chapter a member who meets this high standard of performance.



Within the chapter, Matt England has distinguished himself by holding three chapter offices of importance. He has served as the chapter treasurer, recruitment chair and most recently was the chapter's Venerable Dean. As treasurer, he along with the corporate board treasurer instituted a new system of accounting designed to provide more accountability and tracking of expenses to improve the financial operations of the chapter. As a recruitment chair, Matt was instrumental in recruiting an outstanding group of young men who have since gone on to distinguish themselves both in chapter activities and on-campus work. As Venerable Dean, he led the effort to improve chapter operations and took the lead in developing the materials that enabled the Iowa State Chapter to receive the Malcolm Award at the 2010 Conclave. During his time in these positions, he has also served as a member of Corporate Board, where his keen insights, observations and contributions on behalf of the chapter members have served to make him an invaluable member of the Board.

With regard to activities external to the fraternity, Brother England has been an outstanding leader and has represented the Fraternity with honor and distinction. During his time at Iowa State, Brother England has served as Co-Chair for the Homecoming Central Committee for Greek Activities and as the Assistant Business Manager for the VEISHEA celebration where he managed a \$400,000 budget. Currently, he is the ex-officio student liaison member on the Ames City Council. He is the second Iowa State Acacian to hold this position, following in the footsteps of Craig Buske.

Academically, Matt has earned a more than 3.60 grade point average, and is a member of the University Honors program. While doing all this, Matt has also worked part-time at The Knoll (The Residence of the University President) during his entire college career.

Andrew Joseph - #1048

Andrew is graduating with a degree in electrical engineering and a minor in bioengineering. During his junior year, he served our fraternity as the chapter's secretary. His academic achievements include induction to the Tau Beta Pi engineering honor society and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers. During college, Andrew completed flight training and received his private pilot's license.

Between his semesters at Iowa State, Andrew interned at Garmin as an Aviation Systems Engineer and twice at Sprint as a Network Engineer. He also worked with his bioengineering professor as an undergraduate research assistant in the Department of Electrical Engineering. Andrew will begin employment in June as an Aviation Systems Engineer at Garmin International and will reside in Olathe, Kansas.

Alex Fitzgerald - #1046

A music education major, Alex plans to teach in a high school music program right out of college. Eventually, he plans to pursue at least a master's degree in choral conducting, voice pedagogy, music composition, or musicology.

While at Iowa State, Alex was in the top 2% in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and made the Dean's List every semester. In 2010, he led an Alternative Spring Break trip to West Virginia where he spent a week helping families move things out of their home and businesses in the wake of the flooding that occurred that spring. He was the chapter's lip sync co-chair and Brotherhood chair. He is a re-founding member and four-year member of the men's acappella group "Shy of a Dozen" on campus and has performed at regional and national music conventions as a member of the Iowa State Singers. He has also been active composing and arranging music for this group and the women's acappella group, Count Me In. Both groups performed arrangements composed by Alex.

For the past two summers, he has spent his time working at the Interlochen Center for the Arts. This summer, he will co-manage the Front of House Department and will be in charge of coordinating the staff for approximately 270 concerts over a six-week time period.

Alex Moranic- #1043

During the past two years, Alex has been very involved in the Iowa State Robotics Club and worked on a project where he designed and built two battle bots. Alex was also instrumental in setting up the wireless Internet system in the chapter house. This summer, he will be moving to Cedar Rapids to start his career with Terex Corporation.

Matt Zylstra - #1061

In his three years at Iowa State, Matt has served as Acacia's Recruitment Chair, Treasurer and chapter representative on the Corporate Board. He has also been involved with on-campus activities including the VEISHEA Public Relations Liaison, the Homecoming Central Alumni Relations Co-Chair, the Greek Representative to Jamie Pollard, a Student Advisor to the NCAA Re-Certification Committee, has volunteered his time as an Assistant to the Director of Football Operations, and he is a member of Order of Omega. Following graduation, he will move to St. Louis to take a Business Career Foundation Program position with Boeing.

Dan Congreve - #1036

Dan is graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in electrical engineering this past December, and will be earning his master's degree this summer. During his five years at Iowa State, he has served as Acacia's Vice-President, Scholarship Chair, Waterball Chair, and twice as its Philanthropy Chair. In addition, he was involved in Dance Marathon, ISU Ambassadors, IEEE, and the Honors Program.

He has interned at John Deere and Micron Technology Inc., where he holds a patent for inventing a new way to texture silicon. He has been heavily involved in research at Iowa State on topics ranging from solar cells to autonomous helicopters and has produced four publications.

Dan will be attending MIT this fall to pursue his PhD, working in the area of organic photovoltaics. He was recently awarded the \$120,000 NSF Graduate Research Fellowship.

Mike Weber - #1038

Mike has served in various leadership positions in the chapter as well as on campus. In the chapter he has served Secretary, Chaplain, Junior Dean, and Venerable Dean. He currently serves as one of two Undergraduate Counselors on the International Council. He received the Order of Pythagoras and the George F. Patterson Memorial Scholarship. He also earned the "Above and Beyond" Award from the Department of Student Affairs for his dedication to organizations at Iowa State, one of the highest honors that can be bestowed on an undergraduate student at Iowa State.

His on-campus work included a member of Philanthropy Committee of the Freshman Council, Dance Marathon, Government of the Student Body senator, speaker and vice-speaker. He has also a member of the VEISHEA Catering Committee (2007), Operation Committee (2008), Business Manager (2009 & 2010) and General Co-Chair in 2011.

Board Authorizes Basement Remodeling Project

At our last board meeting (held on April 17th), the board voted to proceed with the remodeling of the basement of the chapter house. There are a number of reasons why we decided to go forward this project (which I will explain shortly), but I wanted to share with you an observation that Don Good #653 made at this meeting. Don lived in the house back in 1964, when the chapter first won the Malcolm Award. He said that at the time, the living conditions were terrible, the annexes and that chapter house all needed a lot of work, but there was an attempt to raise money to build a new chapter house, and morale in the house was at an all-time high. Unfortunately, the effort to build the new chapter house fell through, and he noticed that with its failure, the chapter seemed to lose energy and go downhill. He felt that the situation for the chapter right now, is almost identical to that when he was in the house, and he did not want to see the chapter suffer the same fate. Therefore, he was going to back the effort to renovate the basement.

I also just received a letter from Brother W. Leonard Neidig #332, who lives in Red Wing, Minnesota. Leonard is 92 years old, but he sent me a check for \$1,000 to be used for the

basement renovation project. He also sent me a letter with his donation, which read in part:

...We (Leonard and his wife) wanted to be a small part in supporting another great project to bring 138 Gray Avenue up to a standard you all deserve – the best...I joined the year the house was purchased. The location was and still is the best – but the structure was OLD then. Keep up the great work in putting you best foot forward. So proud.

I was touched and deeply grateful that a Brother who is 92 years old still has such warm and positive feelings for our chapter of our Fraternity that he would take the time to send us a check and to write me a letter and thank me (though really it the Board who deserve the credit) for keeping the chapter moving forward. I've been the Board President for fifteen years, and I can honestly say that it has been one of the most rewarding things I have even done. Every time I visit the chapter I am "re-energized" by the enthusiasm and quality of the men that we have recruited. It is truly a rewarding experience each and every time I visit. The

Board does not want that to be lost, and that is why we are undertaking this project.

In a recent letter, Jeremy Davis provided you with some broad outlines as to why the project is needed, but I wanted to share with you some more details that were not included in his earlier letter, so that you will have a better understanding as to why this project is so critical at this time. I have formatted this letter in a kind “question and answer” system that I thought would be an effective way for me to explain to you what we are trying to do and why. Why is this project needed now?

The answer to this is simple and can be answered in a single word: **competition**. When our chapter was recolonized back in 2000, we really had one of the premier locations and facilities in the Iowa State Greek System. A chapter house with private apartments for upper-classmen, in-room mini-refrigerators and microwave ovens, free laundry facilities, air-conditioning and private bathrooms were unheard-of luxuries that other fraternities simply could not and did not offer. We had a facility that was so far “ahead of its time” that we were often able to pledge men that we (and other) fraternities wanted simply because our facility was that exceptional.

That was ten years ago, today, things are different. Phi Kappa Psi just completed a **\$2.25 million** renovation to their chapter house where every two rooms now share a private bathroom, and all of the public areas of the chapter house have been renovated to modern standards. Sigma Phi Epsilon literally removed all of the interior walls and floors of their chapter house (leaving only the exterior shell), and are completely rebuilding the inside of the chapter house from start to finish – and will have private bathrooms throughout their facility. Just last summer, Alpha Gamma Rho did much the same thing to the interior of its house. Two other fraternities (Delta Upsilon and Pi Kappa Alpha) are also starting \$1 million renovations of their facilities as well. Our neighbor to the north, Sigma Chi, is starting a \$2 million capital campaign to build a brand new chapter house right next to us. Why? Because they have to if they are going to survive and compete for the best incoming students.

In 2000, Acacia set the standard, but we are now falling behind other fraternities because of renovations that we have held off on doing while we completed other work (tucking pointing the house, new doors and windows, new boiler, and so on) that needed to be done. The entire basement and electrical system needs to be upgraded. The two main rooms that comprise the basement have been living on borrowed time for quite a while – and their time has finally run out. They look old, tired and “trashy.” The electrical system was antiquated when I lived in the house in the 1970’s, and it is for all intents and purposes, a dangerous hazard now. The electrical contractor that I spoke with on April 22nd was simply amazed that it still functioned.

When potential new members visit, they really have only **two factors** that they can evaluate when trying to choose between the competing houses, **the men they meet** and **physical facility of the chapter house**. Acacia just lost a potential new member who would have been a great Brother to Phi Kappa Psi because their house was “newer” than ours. Our men were just as good as theirs, but their house was “brand new” while ours is showing its age. We no longer have a choice – we have to renovate the basement area or it will negatively impact our ability to recruit the same quality of men that we have pledged in the past.

Why not just get the alumni back together for a couple of “work weekends” to get this project done?

This is a fair question that has been posed to me by some of our alumni. I know that over the years, many projects in the house have been done by guys in the house when they were underclassmen, or have come back for short projects that could be accomplished in a couple of weekends. This project is different, and times are different. The City of Ames is incredibly aggressive in terms of their requiring permits on construction projects and that only licensed individuals will be allowed to perform the work.

This project will involve gutting the basement back to the studs, leveling the floor and installing new flooring, moving the sprinkler system, moving the fire alarm system, moving a steam heating line, and rewiring the main electrical panel system and the two rooms in the basement. These are all things that simply cannot be done by well meaning alumni in the space of a couple of “work weekends.”

This renovation project is slated to take 60 days, utilizing a full-time crew who will be working five to six days a week in order to get it done before the start of the next school year. Having alumni perform this work is simply not an option. That is why we must use licensed contractors to do the work.

How will the cost of the project be covered?

During my fifteen years on the Board, I have always striven to keep as conservative a financial structure as possible in place for the Board. Fortunately, the Board members over the years have been equally supportive of this goal, so the Board does have some financial resources at its disposal that we can use.

At the present time, the Board has money in two accounts at the bank. The mortgage account has \$42,800 and the capital improvements account has a balance of \$32,600. We have always striven to maintain a balance in the mortgage account equal to at least 12 months worth of mortgage payments. Thus, at the end of our fiscal year in July, we will have the amount need to make the mortgage for the entire next fiscal year (2011-2012). We have always done this to ensure that in the event of a "poor rush" in one year, we would always be able to make our mortgage payment on time. In an emergency, we can take some of the funds from this account to use for some other purpose.

Our capital improvements account is used for major improvements to the property, such as the tuck pointing, new doors, flooring, new steps on the front of the house, and landscaping projects that the Board has accomplished the past few years.

The Board also has a third source of funds which we have tried to avoid using, but it appears that we will now have to utilize. When we had the centennial celebration back in 2009, the Board picked up the cost of the event and did not turn it in to the Acacia Foundation which could and would have legally been able to reimburse us for some \$25,000 in costs that were incurred. The Board wanted to keep the funds in the scholarship account to be used for that purpose if at all possible, but it now appears that we may have no choice but to request those funds which can then be used for this basement renovation project.

Our contractor has given us an estimate of \$54,000 for the renovation, but the upgrade to the electrical service (which we believe the City of Ames is going to require) is estimated to cost

another \$30,000. Thus, we are looking at a total cost for this project of somewhere between \$84,000 - (worst case) \$100,000. This is a far cry from the \$1 million plus that other fraternities have been spending on their chapter houses, but it is still a lot of money.

We have been fortunate so far in that a number of our alumni have generously donated funds towards this restoration project, and we cannot thank them enough. However, we desperately need the support of more of our alumni if the Board is to remain financially solvent in this process. George A. Buck - #345
March 21, 1917 – March 26, 2011



George Andrew Buck was born March 21, 1917 in Boone, Iowa and passed on at the Veterans Administration Hospice on March 26, 2011, Des Moines, Iowa.

He was married to Eleanor Strack. He was a member of Acacia Fraternity while at Iowa State College, and graduated with a degree in forestry from the College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts.

George was a [World War II](#) combat veteran (artillery forward observer), [Purple Heart](#) and [Bronze Star](#) and [Korean War](#) veteran (EOD explosive ordnance disposal), and a retired Lieutenant Colonel, U.S. Army. He was a retired High School Science Teacher (Van Meter, Iowa), longtime adult Boy Scout Volunteer, trainer of BSA adults and scouts, and Woodbadge holder.

**John W. Sheldon - #453
February 5, 1928 – January 29, 2011**



John passed away January 29, 2011 in Edmonds, Washington after a courageous battle with heart and kidney disease. He was born February 5, 1928 in Clarence, Iowa and graduated from Clarence High School in 1945. After graduation, he worked with his father as a carpenter before being drafted into the US Army. On the GI bill, he attended Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa graduating in 1951 with a BS degree in Civil Engineering.

His first employment was with Exxon Petroleum as a Civil Engineer in Venezuela for over 10 years. In Venezuela, he met Lee Krumm of Tacoma, Washington. They married in 1956 and their first two children were born while they lived in Venezuela.

They returned to Washington State in 1961, where John was employed by Constructors Pamco for 27 years. The company specialized in tunneling and construction of pumping stations for Settle metro. He was then employee by Guy F. Atkinson as a project estimator until his retirement in 2008 at the age of 80.

His early years as a carpenter came in handy when they built their house in Edmonds. He spent many weekends finishing the basement, as well as helping his children with their home projects. John was the ultimate handy man; he never threw anything away if there was a chance he could fix it (which most time he could). He enjoyed going to plays and the opera with his wife Lee. They were long-time season ticketholders to the Seattle Opera and the Edmonds Driftwood Theater.

John's faith and family were most important to him. He cherished the time with his family and was always there to give a hug to anyone who needed it or rock a grandchild to sleep. He will be deeply missed.

John is survived by his wife of 54 years, Lee Sheldon; his son and daughter-in-law, Doug and Carol Sheldon of Edmonds, WA; two daughters and son-in-laws, Lynn and Jeff Wilson of Edmonds, WA; Kay and Frank Gallo of Puyallup. Three grandsons, Scott Sheldon, Brent Gallo, and Alex Gallo. Five granddaughters, Kayleen Wilson, Shannon Wilson, Danielle Sheldon, Madison Sheldon, and Regan Gallo. Two brothers, Gilbert Sheldon and Donald Sheldon, and one sister, Shirley Blake, all of Iowa.

April 27, 2011

I'm sorry to report that John is no longer with us on this earth, but he had a wonderful, fulfilling life. The Acacia Fraternity group and his many memories of his time there was always dear to him. I'm sure his experience there was a foundation for his whole life. He was very proud of your high scholarship standings and high morals. His life-long friendship with Richard Shultice, was very special.

No. 1 – he was an engineer and loved his math figures. He recalled that college to him was playing bridge at lunch and going for (can't remember the name – like maple bars or "speed nuts") every evening, or to a movie, then back to the house to study. (Wow! College was never like that for me!)

He recalled the time the fella's there completely buried his car in snow. He would go home weekends and work for his dad – carpentry, etc.

We had a fine life, like most other families, raising three children and taking pride in them. No engineers – one business major, one insurance agent and an elementary school principal. I spent many years in the education field – we met when I was teaching school for the oil company in Venezuela.

John was on dialysis for seven years, and had bypass surgery ten years ago. He needed a new aorta valve, but the surgery was too risky and it finally calcified. His whole body was "all worn out."

Thanks you for all your work and like – keeping the Fraternity up to the high standards. I always was interest and proud to read about all the activities and the ongoing pride – so don't forget me! Thank you!
