Chapter starts Fall Semester with Philanthropy Project

On September 24th, the Iowa State Greek Community hosted a system-wide event called Greeks Give Back. This was a day in which both fraternities and sororities were working side-by-side to benefit the local Ames community. In its early planning periods, Greeks Give Back was highly attended by all of the chapters in the Greek system. This had both positive and negative effects. There were many hands, but unfortunately, there was insufficient work keep everyone busy. The Acacia house leaders were very excited about this opportunity to allow all members of the house to give their time and talents to benefit others, and refused to let the prospect of little work to interfere.

Philanthropy Chair, Austin Schlatter, came to the house with another option. On September 11th, he had participated in a service day in the small town of Maxwell, Iowa. The town had been undergoing numerous jobs in order to present a more updated, clean and welcoming appearance as a community. Community leaders were also helping deserving residents perform needed improvements to their homes. Brother Schlatter told his fellow chapter members about how much their assistance could be used there, and they responded with overwhelming support.

In the late morning of the 24th, 28 chapter members piled into cars and started the drive down to Maxwell. After arriving the travelers were greeted by one of the leaders of the Methodist Mission Group. The organization had already put hours into the restoration of the town, but was willing to supervise the rowdy group of college men that were coming to help. Before work began, however, members were treated to a fantastic lunch of Maid-rites, beans, chips, cookies, and brownies. What more could a guy ask for?

With their bellies full, the members split up into two groups each going to a different house that was being worked on. Both groups did relatively the same work. They started off by scraping existing paint off of the siding, and eventually they moved into priming certain parts of the homes. One of the homes belonged to a family whose parents were laid off from their jobs, with the other to an elderly lady who was unable to pay for the updates. Both recipients were extremely thankful for the assistance that they were receiving.

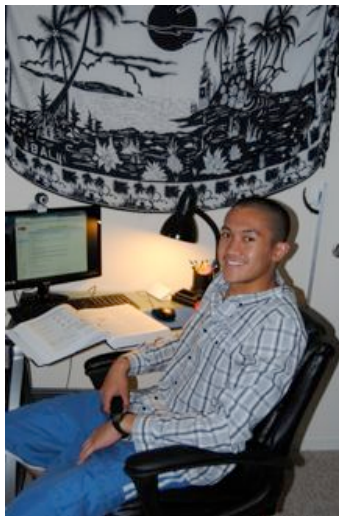

music, jogging, and cycling. Upon graduation, Gabe hopes to begin a fulfilling career in engineering that will allow him to design sound system components and travel.

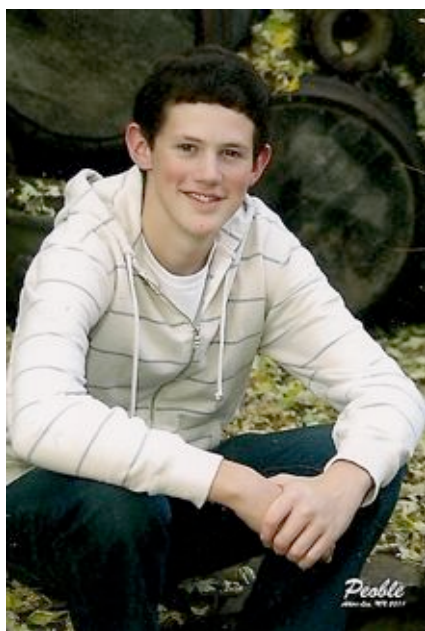


Drew Kenneth Sherman

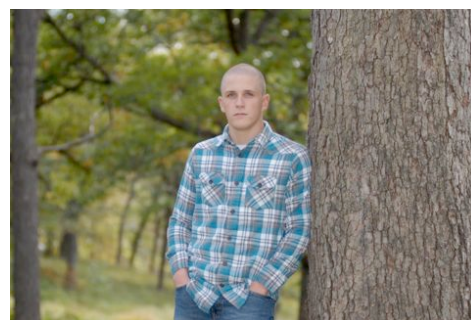


Robert James Vannoy

Active Chapter Report

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Dear Brothers and Parents,

Hello again from Ames! The chapter has been extremely busy since the last newsletter went out; most notably with Homecoming. This year our chapter was paired with the men of Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity and the women of Alpha Delta Pi sorority where our pairing took 1st place overall. Among the many categories homecoming is based off of,

Lawn Display, Yell Like Hell, tournaments, and blood drive are some of the most weighted scoring categories. As you may remember Lawn Display is a physical display that is built in the lawn of one of the pairings' houses and showcases a skit based around a theme. This year's theme was *Cyclone State of Mind*; emulating school spirit. Yell Like Hell is a five minutes skit where students yell and scream the fight song, perform a stomp dance routine, and anything else that jibes with the theme. This semester's Yell Like Hell team took the 2nd place prize, thanks to our chapter's freshman and one sophomore, Cole Westphal.

In addition, our chapter has been volunteering more than ever and has produced record breaking volunteer hours. By the 5th week of the semester our chapter had recorded over 400 service hours! This amount of service has never been seen in the past. One of the largest service events our chapter

Craig Edward Burroughs, 69, of Chicago, Illinois passed away on November 1, 2011 at the Cancer Treatment Center of America in Zion Illinois.

Because of that, all of the effort and hard work have been well worth every minute and every dollar invested. I cannot begin to thank all of our alumni enough for all of the support that have given to the chapter and the Board, but I want you know how much I deeply appreciate all you have done to help us build the chapter to the position it enjoys today.

For now, the Board is in a "financial rebuilding" mode. With all of the major projects accomplished, our attention is now focused on rebuilding our financial strength so that we will be in a position to start the next renovation project. I want to give you an insight into our plans for the future. As you know, quite a few of the chapter houses in the ISU Greek System have undergone major renovations in the past couple of years, and more are planned for the future. The Board knows that we will have to continue with our renovation projects if we are going to remain competitive in the future to attract the type of men that we have as Brothers today.

The next renovation project is slated to start in 2014, and involves a major renovation of the second floor. This plan envisions a near total remodeling of the second floor so that each room would have its own private bathroom, but at the same time ensuring that the chapter house would remain capable of housing twenty-nine men. One of the advantages that we have is that we are a relatively "small" house. This provides us with the ability of maintaining a full house without the need to constantly recruit an exceptionally large pledge class to ensure that we can cover our costs. More importantly, it provides the members with a better opportunity to truly share the close bonds of Brotherhood will enrich their college experience in ways that, just having a place to live, can never match.

Our goal is to have a minimum of \$100,000 in savings before we start the next project, not counting the funds in the mortgage reserve account. An ambitious goal to be sure, but one that I feel we can easily reach so long as the Board maintains the sound fiscal policies that we have followed for the past fifteen years.

More importantly, I would like to encourage all of our alumni to stop in anytime that they are in the Ames area. If you come for a football game, a concert, or any other event, stop in! The men in the house will be glad to show you around, and I know that you will be impressed with all that has been done during the past few years. I have been very fortunate to be around when some of our alumni stop in, and they simply cannot get over all of the changes that they see.
